

Scotch Tape

Have you ever tried to re-roll scotch tape? It seems that no matter how hard you try, it will never be the same as it was before. You inevitably have small air bubbles or wrinkles in it and it probably will lose its sticking quality. Life is somewhat like that image. Once we begin to unroll it (live it), we must continue to go forward because it serves no purpose to go backward. We cannot relive our life. Like re-rolled scotch tape, life lived in the past is a waste. Life



lived in the present projects into the future. It is very practical and can be very meaningful --not only to ourselves but to others as well.

What purpose does one's life have if not to live a life that touches others? One single life can be a sealer in someone else's life. It can be the glue that makes a difference in the future of another person. Of course, once we start unrolling ourselves we become vulnerable to the life we touch. We absorb the material of what we become bound to.

Once tape is placed on paper, especially one with print on it, it is almost impossible to remove the tape without taking some of the print or paper off with it.

Life is like tape. Sometimes as we begin to unroll it, to open up and be useful, we panic and try to re-do the wrappings. We don't want to become vulnerable. We deceive ourselves into thinking that we can remain attached unto ourselves but like the bubbles and wrinkles on re-rolled tape, we find that no matter how hard we try to be as we once were, we cannot fully achieve that task. The only away to smooth out the wrinkles and bubbles is to keep unwinding the roll. Tape unto itself it serves no purpose. It's only when it is applied to something that it becomes beneficial.

The lifespan of a roll of tape doesn't really matter. The important thing is that the roll was used. To keep to ourselves is selfish. Our life's purpose is not to remain rolled up but to become unrolled to benefit another person. What kind of life expectancy we have doesn't really matter. All that matters is how we use ourselves for God's purposes.
