A Note from Pastor Kim

"The season of Lent in the early church was meant to be a time of preparation for baptism. For people to prepare themselves through prayer, fasting and penitence to enter the body of Christ". According to the Handbook of the Christian Year, "it is a time for those who have sinned to reconcile with the faith community and be restored to fellowship of the church." The handbook clearly points out that though these traditions were not indicated as practices of the season they developed and were meant to feed those seeking to become members and be baptized and the community of their also urgent task of forgiveness and contrition for the weakness as humans allow to create division.

Both were urgent because from the earliest of church development we know the expectation of Christ's returning, was expected to be immediate. Today, we must still prepare for that return. We are able through the 40 days of Lent to take those tasks on ourselves to ready ourselves for the return of Jesus and the celebration of the resurrection.

On Ash Wednesday, we remember the delicate and blessed importance of the life we have been given. As we receive ashes, we recognize that only through the blessing so God we out of the dust of the universe, and one day we will return. On Sunday before Ash Wednesday, you will receive a small packet of Ashes in worship. You can also contact the Church office to arrange pick up or mail delivery. There will also be an option to receive Ashes in the sanctuary at Noon on Ash Wednesday

I look forward to our journey through Lent together this year. I also recognize that we due to ongoing Covid and other health concerns must adjust how we do what we do. Please continue to be patient, flexible and actively care for those you encounter by remaining as masked and distanced as you feel appropriate. 40 Days 40 Bags (from Pastor Kim)

What kind of practice of devotion has special meaning for me during Lent? For years, I have done a daily devotional practice of removing excess items, stress, and clutter from my life. It is called **40 Bags in 40 Days**. This takes place every day between Ash Wednesday and Easter (excluding Sundays). It doesn't take a lot of time but it creates significant rewards both aesthetically and spiritually. Initially begun as a Facebook challenge years



ago, I have been following this for the last few year. Here is what happens: Each day I approach a space in my home. It may be a kitchen junk draw, a closet, a bathroom shelf or the stack of junk mail on the kitchen island. I don't attempt an entire room or major project like the garage or attic. Only a section of a space like a shelf or draw in that space.

Step 1: Identify the one space for the day and plan your time to do it. Go to that space with a bag a box or another item like a recycle bin.

Step 2: Pick up an item from that space. Examine the item. Ask yourself: Where did it come from? How has it blessed me? Does it continue to bless me? Am I called to pass the item? These questions will help you determine if this item has value to you now and respects it history in your life.

Step 4: Thank God for the blessing you have received from it. Then if you have determined it is a keeper, put it back. If you want someone else to have it like a family or friend label it and place aside for them. If it has no further use or meaning, then make it go away.

Step 5: Place it in a bag appropriate for where it will go. A brown paper bag, trash bag, recycle bin or other. It does not matter... as long as the items are collected into bags and the clutter diminishes.

Step 6: Make it go away. You can recycle it, donate it to Savers, Goodwill, Salvation Army or church yard sale*. You can even throw it away as appropriate. Do not keep it around. <u>TAKE IT TO ITS DESTINATION EACH DAY or at the earliest possible time.</u>

I find this practice helpful to reflect on the blessings I have, encounter, and reflect of the challenges I have faced as I prepare for Easter with more clarity of mind and less clutter in my home.
